

Labour Force in Health Care and Social Assistance Industries

This newsletter provides information on labour force in health care and social assistance industries for Peel Halton Dufferin (PHD) residents by using official data from the 2001 Census of Canada. According to Statistics Canada, labour force refers to persons 15 years and over, excluding institutional residents, who were employed or unemployed during the week (Sunday to Saturday) prior to Census Day, and who had last worked for pay or in self-employment in either 2000 or 2001. Highlights for the Peel-Halton-Dufferin Area

- Compared to Canada and Ontario, PHD has a lower percentage of population aged 15 years and over employed in health care and social assistance industries.
- With respect to areas of employment in health care and social assistance industries, the top three are hospitals; child day-care services; and nursing and residential care facilities.

Implications for Human Services Sector

 Increased demand for jobs in health care and social services sectors.

Did you know?

How many people in PHD were employed in health care and social assistance industries at the time of the 2001 Census of Canada?

In 2001, there were 52,585 people employed in health care and social assistance industries in PHD. PHD has a lower percentage of population aged 15 years and over employed in health care and social assistance industries (6.9%), compared to Canada (10%) and Ontario (9.1%).


What kinds of health care and social assistance industries are the residents of PHD employed in?

In 2001, the top three areas of employment in health care and social assistance industries were hospitals (15,370); child day-care services (8,375); and nursing and residential care facilities (6,670).
